Working with Parents/Carers

Parents/ Carers are welcomed and valued at Ashmole Primary. We work in partnership to develop mutual support, encouragement and consultation as we believe that a child will work more successfully when home and school share the same aims.

The Head Teacher and Senior Leaders are available to discuss any issues with regard to your child or the school in general. Parents are always welcome to talk to class teachers.

ATTENDANCE

Regular and punctual attendance is extremely important in order for your child to gain full benefit from all the experiences at Ashmole Primary School. However, if your child is unwell we ask that you telephone the school before 8:50am on the first day of absence to explain the reason. A letter confirming this should be sent with your child when they return to school. The school will not authorise holidays in term time.

WELFARE

We have qualified first aiders and a Welfare Officer who act as the first point of contact for any pupil who requires medical attention during the school day.

UNIFORM REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL PUPILS

Ashmole Primary is a uniform wearing school. Uniform will be available to be purchased from the school uniform shop.

- A small flat plain silver/gold stud in pierced ears (1 per ear).

BEHAVIOUR

We aim to create a secure, calm and caring environment in which all children can thrive. Everyone has the right to feel happy and secure at Ashmole Primary. The ethos of the school is founded on the relationships of all who work and learn here.

We regard all adults as role models and have high expectations of the children's behaviour. We expect all members of the school to treat each other with respect. Children, parents/carers and staff must have a clear understanding of what is unacceptable and know that this will be dealt with in a consistent manner. We aim to work in partnership and hope that parents/carers recognise this shared responsibility.

HOMEWORK

All children will be given work to do at home in order to practise aspects of their learning. The amount of homework will increase as your child progresses through the school. It is important for parents/carers to encourage children to regularly read at home, preferably every day.

EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

These include a Breakfast Club, After School Club, various Sports and Language Clubs.

The Curriculum



Ashmole Primary provides a broad, balanced and creative curriculum, compliant with the National Curriculum. A wide range of subjects are taught, focusing on the development of knowledge, understanding and skills, with a strong emphasis on the core subjects of English, Mathematics and Science and designed to ensure that pupils of all abilities excel. A curriculum where pupils develop knowledge, understanding and skills through the teaching of English, Mathematics, Science, Computing, RE, PSHE, Geography, History, Music, Art, Design & Technology, Spanish and Physical Education is taught, where relevant links are made between subjects. There are daily lessons in English and Mathematics. The use of Computing is incorporated across the curriculum and the whole school curriculum

is underpinned by social, moral, spiritual and cultural education, with a values based and inclusive approach. There are high expectations for the behaviour and safety of the pupils at Ashmole Primary. The highest emphasis is placed on the acquisition of the key skills of reading, writing and oral communication in Literacy, which is evidenced through pupils' work across all curriculum areas. In addition, the teaching of Mathematics focuses on age appropriate mathematical knowledge as a starting point, with high expectations for a level of mastery in each year group and an application of mathematical skills across the curriculum. The Early Years Foundation Stage (Reception) follows the EYFS curriculum with a planned transition into Year 1 where pupils progress onto the National Curriculum. The work children

undertake is planned by the class teacher according to the school schemes of work; prepared by subject leaders. Pupils are provided with a curriculum that enables them to gain the essential knowledge they need to become educated citizens. There is a daily act of collective worship.

Throughout the school specialist subject teaching particularly in those areas which may be less well taught by non-specialists for example, PE, Music and Spanish. Spanish has been chosen as the main language to teach at Ashmole Primary. Pupils are exposed to the teaching of Spanish from the Early Years through weekly short lessons with more extended lessons as they move through the school in preparation for secondary. The mastering of Spanish provides a good basis to learn other languages later.

Ashmole Primary has excellent grounds for sporting use and the development of sporting talent. Sports coaches and trained teachers work with the Primary School from Reception, teaching lessons and running after school clubs. The school has access to the sporting facilities of the Academy and can become the Primary School sporting hub for all the schools in the area which may lack those facilities. The Primary School encourages pupils to develop their skills in music through whole class instrumental lessons taught by a music specialist and individual peripatetic music lessons.

Admissions

Ashmole Primary School is a Primary Free School located in the London Borough of Barnet which caters for children aged between 4 - 11 years. Our full Admissions Policy is available on our school website www.ashmoleprimary.org

The school admits 60 children in Reception each September.

CHILDREN WITH AN EDUCATION HEALTH AND CARE PLAN

There are separate statutory procedures in place which govern the admission of children with special educational needs (“SEN”) for whom an education health and care plan (“EHC plan”) has been issued by their Local Authority. This means that the parents of children who have an EHC plan should not apply for admission to the School under this Admission Policy. If parents have a preference for the School to be named as the provider in their child’s EHC plan, the Local Authority needs to be made aware of this so that they can consider whether the school is suitable in consultation with the child’s parents and the school.

OVERSUBSCRIPTION CRITERIA

Where more applications are received than there are places available, the available places will be allocated in the following order of priority:

1. Looked After and Previously Looked After Children

Looked after and previously looked after children will be allocated places under this category by reference to the proximity of the child’s home address to the School, with those living nearer receiving higher priority.

A “looked after child” is a child who is in the care of the local authority, or is being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of its social services functions at the time of application. A “previously looked after child” is a child who was in public care, but ceased to be so because they were adopted or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order immediately after being in public care as well as those children who appear (to the Local Governing Committee) to have been in state care outside of England and ceased to be in state care as a result of being adopted.

2. Children with a Sibling at Ashmole Primary School

Children who will have a sibling at Ashmole Primary School at the date of application will be allocated places under this category by reference to the proximity of the child’s home address to the School, with those living nearer receiving higher priority.

3. Children of Employees of Ashmole Trust

Children with a parent who has been employed by Ashmole Trust, excluding employees on a casual contract, for a period of at least two years at the application deadline, whether based at Ashmole Primary School or the Trust’s secondary academy, Ashmole Academy, or who were recruited to fill a vacant post for which there was a demonstrable skill shortage, will be allocated places under this category by reference to the proximity of the child’s home address to the School, with those living nearer receiving higher priority.

4. All Other Children

Children who do not fall into any of the categories above will be allocated places under this category by reference to the proximity of the child’s home address to the School, with those living nearer receiving higher priority.

Distance Measuring

The distance between the child’s home address and the School will be measured in a straight line between the address point for the child’s home, supplied by Ordnance Survey, to the school’s main gate using the Council’s computerised geographical information system.

TIE BREAKER

Where two applications cannot otherwise be separated because the distance from the child’s home address to the School is equal, the order in which places will be allocated will be determined by random lottery in the presence of a person who is independent of the School and the Local Authority.

TWINS AND CHILDREN OF A MULTIPLE BIRTH

Where a child who is a twin or a child of a multiple birth has failed to achieve a place in the usual way but their twin or at least one of their siblings of a multiple birth has achieved a place in the usual way, those children will be admitted to the School above the PAN for that year group.

APPLICATIONS FOR ADMISSION IN THE NORMAL ADMISSION ROUND

Applications for admission to Reception Year in September must be made to the Local Authority by completing their Common Application Form (“CAF”) which is accessible via the Local Authority’s admissions page on its website.

Failure to submit the CAF by the application deadline will result in the application being dealt with as a late application, which means that it will be accepted but will not be considered until

all applications received on or before the application deadline have been considered, which will substantially reduce the chance of achieving a place.

AGE ON ADMISSION TO RECEPTION YEAR

All children are entitled to a full-time place in Reception Year at a primary school from the September following their fourth birthday. Children do not, however, reach compulsory school age until the first of three prescribed dates after their fifth birthday. These prescribed dates are 31 December, 31 March and 31 August.

DEFERRED ENTRY AND PART-TIME ATTENDANCE

Parents who have achieved a place for their child in Reception Year at the School can then choose to defer their child’s start date until they have reached compulsory school age (i.e. on one of the three prescribed dates stated above) and still retain their child’s place in Reception Year at the School.

Parents of “summer born children” can choose to delay their child starting school for a whole school year. Please see full policy for further details.

Parents may also choose to send their child to school part-time until they reach

compulsory school age (i.e. on one of the three prescribed dates stated above).

Delayed Entry for “Summer born children”

Parents of children born between 1 April and 31 August (known as “summer born children”) have the following options in relation to their child:

1. To start school full-time in Reception Year in the September following their fourth birthday in the usual way; or
2. To retain the place they have achieved for their child in Reception Year and decide that their child will start school later in the school year (i.e. deferred entry) and/or attend part-time, as set out above; or
3. To lose any place achieved for their child in Reception Year and delay (rather than defer) their child starting school for one whole school year (i.e. until the following September). Please see full policy for further details.

APPLICATIONS FOR ADMISSION OUTSIDE NORMAL AGE GROUP

All parents have a right to apply for their child to be admitted to a year group above or below their child's normal year group, however it is for the admission authority for each school to decide whether to agree to this or not. Parents do not have an absolute right to decide that their child will be educated outside their normal age group.

In order to apply, parents must complete a separate application form (called an Application for Admission Outside Normal Age Group form, which is available for download via the School's website) and submit it to the Local Governing Committee of the School and must include supporting documentation. Applications should be submitted as early as possible so that all options are kept open before deadlines pass, as an application for admission will also have to be made at some stage.

On receipt of a completed application form and any supporting documentation, the Governing Body will need to decide whether to agree or refuse the application. This decision will be made on the basis of the circumstances of each case and in the best

interests of the child concerned. The factors the Governing Body will consider include the following:

The parent's views; the Head Teacher's views; information about the child's academic, social and emotional development; where relevant, the child's medical history and the views of their medical professionals; whether the child has previously been educated or attended a nursery outside their normal age group; whether the child may naturally have fallen into a lower age group if not for being born prematurely. Please see full policy for further details.

IN YEAR ADMISSION AND APPLICATIONS TO OTHER YEAR GROUPS

The School participates in the Local Authority's coordinated scheme for in-year admission and admission to year groups other than Reception Year. These applications must be made to the Local Authority, rather than the School. Further information about this, including the relevant application form, is accessible via the Local Authority's admissions page on its website.

ADMISSION TIMETABLE

The deadline for applications for admission to Reception Year in the normal admission round is on or around 15th January. Late applications will be accepted but will not be considered until after all of the applications received on or before the application deadline have been processed, substantially reducing the chance of achieving a place.

National Offer Day for places in Reception Year in the normal admission round is on or around 16th April. On that date, parents will be notified whether their application for admission has been successful or not. Where an application is unsuccessful, the reason for this will be confirmed in the notification letter.

ADMISSION APPEALS

Parents have a statutory right of appeal against the refusal of a place which will be heard before an independent panel. Full details about the statutory right of appeal, including how and when the request for an appeal must be lodged, will be confirmed in the notification letter sent to parents on National Offer Day.

Pupil voice is of paramount importance at Ashmole Primary School. We encourage children to share their views and they support the school through our School Council, Eco Warrior group Play Buddies, Healthy Eating and Travel Ambassadors. The eldest pupils in our school are given the opportunity to take on the role of Head Boy and Girl.”
